This program will discuss the final changes to the Centers for Medicare and Medicaid Services (CMS) infection control standards that went into effect Nov. 29, 2019, and the corresponding 49-page Hospital Infection Control Worksheet. The changes include a requirement to have an antibiotic stewardship program and specific guidance on the selection and role of an infection preventionist.

This webinar will review important memos on infection control issues from CMS, including those related to the coronavirus, as well as:

- Institute for Safe Medication Practices (ISMP IV) guidelines and safe injection practices issues
- CDC vaccine storage and handling toolkit and the CDC procedures for cleaning and disinfecting reusable medical devices

- The Hospital-Acquired Condition (HAC) Reduction Program and potential impact on CMS payments
- Case studies of infection control deficiencies as published by CMS
