Falls is an important patient safety and risk management issue as it is the number one hospital acquired condition. This webinar will discuss how to comply with the Joint Commission (TJC) and the Centers for Medicare and Medicaid (CMS) hospital Conditions of Participation (CoP) standards on falls. This session will also include information on medications that increase the fall rate, and the pharmacist's role in the fall program.

Attendance is a must for anyone serving on the falls team in addition to any hospital staff members interested in preventing and reducing the number of falls in the

hospital setting. All hospitals should have a falls team, and these team members should receive the latest training and information available regarding falls.

- Discuss the issue of decreased mobility and how it can result in falls
- List evidenced based fall assessment tools used in inpatient and outpatient settings
