



Who do you think would better handle ___ as president?



















Democrats generally need to be at about 40% with white voters to win.




Republicans have won white voters, but they're on the decline










Trump margin of victory with white, non-college voters





Biden won 65% of Latinos in 2020, but that was actually slightly less than Hillary Clinton.


Democrats saw a decline in Latino margins in each swing state






FIGURE 5. Importance of Candidate's Stance on Abortion, by Party Affiliation Percent who say they:






Percent of eligible voters who have turned out














